A visit to Historiska Museet, the Swedish history museum in Stockholm

In February I had the chance for a visit to the Swedish history museum and a "behind the scenes" peek at their textile department. My most favourite parts of the museum were the medieval art section, and the 14th and 15th century section of Sweden's history, where you can see a replica of Queen Margareta's golden gown (The cloth of gold original belongs to Uppsala Cathedral), and I found this wonderful velvet purse. Unfortunately my camera struggled with the low light and glass case. There were many more beautiful textile details to be found, especially in the section about St. Bridget.

For anyone interested in medieval armour the exhibition room about the Battle of Visby 1361 is a must. Since I was a bit short on time I had but a fleeting glance, but will return for a proper look next time I'm in Stockholm.

I gleaned many interesting clothing details from the altarpieces on show in the medieval art section. There are mainly altarpieces, painted or in relief, and a few statues and a couple of everyday items like a chest, or a bench. One section is set up like a medieval church or chapel, which puts the artwork back into its original context.

When studying religious figures for clothing details I find that it gets a bit tricky when you try to identify saints, especially when there are quite a few in the same altarpiece; with similar attributes, and no detailed description.

Something I had not come across before is that some saints were always depicted with red shoes, by different artists and across a century, which made me wonder if that was another message to the contemporary viewer, and I would love to know if anyone else has noticed that, and if they were able to identify the saints.

I had started my visit with a peek at the storage and study area of the textile department, and had been shown some amazing velvets and silks from church vestments. I loved that I was able to find similar shapes and designs in the artwork of the period. There were several beautiful depictions of velvets, I have added a detail photo of a bishop's cloak from a Pieta altarpiece from the late 15th century, and the cloth of gold depiction on an extended holy family (both Mary and Anne are shown in cloth of gold gowns)

Wall Paintings of Eton


In the early days of the Costume Society we visited Eton to see the 15th century wall-paintings, so I was pleased to see this book with many colour photographs. The condition of most of the paintings is, understandably, not the best. As usual, the shoes at the bottom have suffered rather more than the higher parts. In the Catalogue section from p.93 there are a few line drawings of the scenes showing barefoot, soled hose, shoes including toe-shapes, sole, and ankle, calf and knee-boots, for which I was very grateful. Part III from p.143 has similar descriptions of the early 16th century schoolboys in black, low cut, bar shoes.

The Annual Textile Art of Today - call for submissions

Triennial of Textile, without borders, the civic association proclaims the fifth year of the international art project Textile Art of Today 2018. Textile Art of Today is an international tour of contemporary professional textile art and its latest trends. It also includes a category of student's art works of art schools. The exhibition will present works that cross the boundaries of classic textiles and which are innovative. We will be working with modern technologies, such as linking mobile apps with art works. We would like to see art works that incorporate scents, light, shadow, kinetics, and other works that respond to the current themes of the global world. Of course there is also classic textile tapestry. At the exhibition, we welcome textile installations, objects, videos, works that are closer to sculptural but also jewellery creation.

The fourth annual of Textile Art of Today took place in 2015 until January 2017. 230 artists from 41 countries worldwide signed for the exhibition. The Curator's Committee selected 76 artists and students. Subsequently, the international jury awarded the Grand Prix of Bozena Augustinova, the 3 Excellence Awards, the Tatra Gallery Award, the Polish Cultural Institute Award and the Student Award. The show was extremely successful. It travelled through four Central European countries (Slovakia, Czech Republic, Poland and Hungary) and was visited by 40 000 visitors.

The fifth annual Textile Art of Today will take place on 7 of September 2018 at the Danubiana Meulensteen Art Museum in Bratislava, Slovakia. On this day the international jury will award the best art works. After the exhibition on 25 of November 2018 in Bratislava, the exhibition will be gradually reinstalled in: the Tatra Gallery in Poprad (SK), the Gallery of the Slovak Museum in Uherske Hradiste (CZ), the Pesti Vigadó Gallery Budapest (HU) and finally the Historical Museum in Bielsko-Biala (PL).
